· Which is the least popular household job? Who normally ends up doing it? Perhaps different members of the family could take it in turns doing this job for a fortnight!


· Go on a family litter picking walk to help clean up a part of your neighbourhood. Don't forget


to wash your hands afterwards! Litter picking should be supervised by an adult.











Maundy Money The name "Maundy" which we use today comes from the Latin word

on foot along the dirty, dusty roads. At the last supper, Jesus himself humbly took water and a towel and washed the feet of each one of his friends.

In the Middle Ages, English kings and queens followed Jesus' example and washed the feet of beggars, to show that in God's eyes everyone is equal. They also gave gifts and money to the poor.

The monarch carries on this tradition. On Maundy Thursday each year a different cathedral is visited and during a special church service Maundy money is distributed to people who have humbly and selflessly served their local communities in practical ways.



FASCINATING FACTS

Have you ever heard the saying to 'eat humble pie'?

- · When someone 'eats humble pie' it means they have to admit to being wrong and sometimes give an apology.
- The phrase has been around for six centuries (600 years)!
- Back in the 15th century the tastier, more expensive cuts of meatwere usually only eaten by rich people and were often roasted.
- The offal (liver, kidneys, heart, sweetmeats) was considered poorer quality meat and known as 'umbles'. It needed to be cooked more slowly and was often used in pies.
- The poorer people therefore made Umble Pie. Over time the pie became known as humble pie.

School Uniform

School uniform is worn by all children attending St Barnabas and St Philip's CE Primary school because we believe that a smart School Uniform helps increase children's sense of identity and pride in their school. Parental co-operation is an invaluable source of support. Extremes of fashion in shoes, clothing and hairstyles will not be permitted within the school.

- The children wear a uniform, which is white, grey, black and red.
- For Health and Safety reasons, ballet pumps, shoes with heels, open toes and backs are not permitted. Shoes fastened with laces or a T-bar across the foot is essential.
- Except watches, the wearing of jewellery is not permitted within the school for Health and Safety reasons.
- For children with pierced ears, plain stud earrings must only be used.
- Please note that SMART watches are not permitted to be worn at school.
- Please note that shoulder length hair should be tied back for health and safety reasons
- PE kit to only be worn on PE days, unless told otherwise

Parents and carers of pupils that do not wear their uniform correctly will be contacted and asked to bring a uniform. If this is not possible then pupils will be provided with the uniform they are missing, and parents will be asked to ensure correct uniform is worn the following day.

Governors Fund 23-24

As you may be aware, we are a voluntary aided Church of England Primary School with approximately 210 pupils. We are devoted to providing our pupils with the best possible learning environment based on decent morals and values, and we are proud to have served our community for over a century.

As a Church of England School, we are required to contribute an annual maintenance fee to the London Diocese Board for School. This fee allows the school to effectively benefit from the LDBS maintenance scheme that provides 90% of the overall cost for approved capital projects including redevelopment of the existing facilities and major refurbishments.

Over the years, our pupils have benefitted from a range of capital projects, including, a new bridge linking two blocks, a fully equipped school kitchen, music room, Computing suite, library, refurbished classrooms, new toilets, a new roof and skylights.

I am sure you will appreciate, it is vital for our pupil's education, that we provide them with the best facilities possible. This can only be achieved through the kind generosity of parents, and though the fee per pupil is voluntary, we ask all parents to contribute £45 per pupil per academic year or such amount, as they are able, in order that our pupils continue to benefit from the LDBS maintenance scheme.

Unfortunately, any shortfall in the overall Governors maintenance fund will have to be taken from the school delegated budget that in turn will mean funds being diverted from other areas of the curriculum.
