We will write our own versions of traditional tales, retellings, character studies, and monologues. Pupils will develop their ability to craft engaging narratives with rich characterisation, vivid descriptions, and thoughtful dialogue. There will also be a focus on editing and refining writing for clarity and impact.

We will explore **The Island at the End of Everything** by Kiran Millwood-Hargrave and **The Final Year** by Matt Goodfellow. Pupils will develop their analytical and inferential skills while discussing themes of resilience, identity, and belonging.

We will study how fossils are formed and what they tell us about life on Earth millions of years ago. Pupils will explore the role of fossils in understanding evolution and extinction, as well as their importance as evidence of historical changes in the planet's climate and environments.
